# My volunteering experience

I am a hardware guy, an old hardware guy. I was the caretaker of an array of old machines, mostly storage devices, related hardware, and written archives, for several years as a hobby adjoining my career at IBM San Jose. When I retired in 2004 I was invited back to IBM part time to catalog the collection.

I had heard about the Computer History Museum from several sources. With the encouragement of

IBM's archivist, we invited Kirsten Tashev and Dag Spicer from CHM to come down to San Jose to see what we had. They were quite enthusiastic about our collection.

About that time, the IBM site and its hard disk drive business were sold to Hitachi Global Storage Technologies, so it became necessary to move the historic collection from the plant site. The collection was divided between IBM archives in New York, CHM, and as it turned out, Hitachi. There were some painful decisions, but many of the best artifacts came to the Museum as I had wanted.

And when "my" artifacts came to Computer History Museum, I came with them. At first my role was to help Allison, CHM's registrar, catalog the IBM pieces, but then I moved on to cataloging other parts of the Museum's collection. It was really always my plan to stay on as a volunteer. Remember that I am an old hardware guy, but the plan was reinforced when I found that I liked CHM and its people and, of course, I like the artifacts too.

In addition to cataloging I have participated in the move to the Yosemite warehouse in Milpitas from both ends - Packing at Shoreline and storing, palletizing and other tasks at Yosemite.

I enjoy it all and I find that my association with CHM is not only interesting and satisfying, but it also gives me opportunities for the same sort of interaction with good and interesting people that I found so important in my life during my long IBM career.

I'm also involved with the RAMAC disk drive restoration which came about more directly from my IBM experiences and my involvement with early storage devices as well as my personal hobby of restoring and touring early brass-era automobiles.

To date I have not chosen to be a docent or a greeter or other "front-of-

house" activity, but I certainly don't rule it out and I'm sure that these would be fascinating as well. There are lots of volunteer opportunities at Computer History Museum. If you have any interest in the subject matter, I recommend that you give it a try. »



### This Month in History

December 29, 1939 Shockley Makes Historic Notebook Entry

William Shockley records in his laboratory notebook that it should be possible to replace vacuum tubes with semiconductors. Eight years later, he, Walter Brattain and John Bardeen at AT&T Bell



Laboratories successfully tested the point-contact transistor. Shockley developed much of the theory behind transistor action, and soon postulated the junction transistor, a much more reliable device. It took approximately ten years from the 1947 discovery before transistors replaced vacuum tubes in computer design as manufacturers learned to make them reliable and a new generation of engineers learned how to use them.
