



As a result of our new training series, we've trained 15 people to use Community Memory. That's 15 people who, before our on-site trainings, knew very little about Community Memory. Our training series included 16 sessions, at least one at each site. With 16 training sessions and 15 new users, that's nearly one new user per training, and that's a ratio that equals success in our book.

It has been equally pleasing just to be out at the sites on a more regular basis. Not only do we get to see you more often, but it's enabled us to connect with more Community Memory participants. That's important because it gives us a better picture of who uses Community Memory, which helps us reach out to potential new users more directly. It's been one year since Community Memory expanded to our current network of ten public-access computer terminals. We're encouraged by the increase in usage in the past year: two thousand people use Community Memory each month and there are now eighty-seven different discussion forums. As you know, Community Memory participants are often people who would not ordinarily have access to computers. We're delighted to have a opportunity to introduce them to our computerized information exchange.

To that end, we are launching a new training series which we hope will encourage those who may have been shy before, to experiment with Community Memory and to discover new information and vital discussions. Additionally, our team of programmers have updated the Community Memory software to simplify a number of functions.


Based on the information you gave me, I've developed a schedule for on-site trainings. I've enclosed this schedule for your review as well as a sign-up sheet which can be posted near the Community Memory terminal at your site. We spoke briefly two weeks ago when I called to express interest in placing a Community memory terminal in the Ecology Center Building. In this letter I tried to summarize the main ideas behind Community Memory, our current work, and why Ecology Center Building would be a superb site for one of our terminals.

Since 1976, Community Memory Project, a California non-profit corporation, has been promoting the concept of easy-to-use, publicly accessible terminals that connect people and ideas throughout the community. We operated a small, four terminal network in Berkeley from 1984 through 1988. It was the pilot project for the larger, more sophisticated system being installed now. Our work in Berkeley is funded in part by the Telecommunications Education Trust, established by the California Public Utilities Commission. CM is a demonstration project of a communications technology built specifically for communities.

While electronic bulletin boards, and conferencing systems are used by increasing numbers of professionals and PC owners representing the upper strata of demographic charts, we are unique by making these tools publicly accessible and intelligible to computer novices. We are committed to bridging the gulf between information rich and information poor: those with access to new tools and those without. Rather than displacing face-to-face interaction, CM strives to create new contacts for individuals, to enhance participation, dialogue and crosstalk. Users can read messages on the system for free and contribute their own messages for 25c. All quarters are collected in a built-in coin box.

While the new system is only six months old, the size of the database is growing rapidly. Considerable energy is being expended organizing and publishing social services information. For example: emergency food, shelter, and legal information are available, as are comprehensive directories of job placement programs, and youth employment and training programs. The Berkeley City Council directed various city departments to publish information on CM. City Council agendas are already being posted, soon city jobs, recreation schedules, refuse and recycling schedules, as well as a directory to city services will also be available. Many self-employed people, consultants and odd-jobbers are listing their services, an online mechanic answers questions regarding cars' symptoms, and the housewares buy/sell forum is also thriving. Current topics and books are discussed. Many jokes are exchanged. And that's just the tip of the iceberg.

Seven terminals are already in place, with three more needing sites. To attract users we rely on foot traffic. We look to locations that have long hours, and are open at least five days each week. The Ecology Center Building is a home for community-involved, grass roots, progressive groups that can benefit most from having access to Community Memory. This makes your building a superb potential site for one of our terminals.

The arrangements are simple. We install a freestanding, selfcontained terminal (it's in an elegant wood cabinet) which connects to a dedicated phone line. We pay for the phone line installation and the monthly service fee. We even provide liability insurance for the users of CM at your location. Site hosts agree to provide floor space for at least a six month period and continuous electricity for the terminal (equivalent to a 100 Watt light bulb). Whatever money is collected in the mechanical coin box is used by CM, to defray phone line costs.

I am including a flyer which is available at all our terminals, a photocopy of a photograph depicting the terminal and its dimensions, and a description of the objectives we are addressing as part of the Telecommunications Education Trust-funded work. I look forward to speaking with you in the very near future, and will be delighted to give you and any interested colleagues a hands-on tour of CM and answer whatever questions you may have.

Current topics and books are discussed. Many jokes are exchanged. And that's just the tip of the iceberg.

Seven terminals are already in place, with three more needing sites. Since your building is now the new home of community-minded, grass roots, progressive groups I would like to make certain that you and people frequenting your offices have ready access to CM.

I proposed this idea to Hal Brandel, the building's owner. His ambivalence suggests that formal requests from you, the tenants, may be needed in order to secure permission to site a Community Memory terminal in the building. With a phone call or letter to Mr. Brandel (c/o Grubb & Ellis 475 14th Street, Suite 1250, Oakland, CA 94612 Ph: 444-7500) you can insure that the Ecology Center Building, the newest home to concerned, forward-thinking organizations is also a site for a CM terminal - Berkeley's public access information and resources exchange. By the way, Mr. Brandel would not be incurring any expenses in the process, as all the equipment, phone line charges, even liability insurance near the terminal would be paid for by CM.



As a result of our new training series, we've trained 15 people to use Community Memory. That's 15 people who, before our on-site trainings, knew very little about Community Memory. Our training series included 16 sessions, at least one at each site. With 16 training sessions and 15 new users, that's nearly one new user per training, and that's a ratio that equals success in our book.

It has been equally pleasing just to be out at the sites on a more regular basis. Not only do we get to see you more often, but it's enabled us to connect with more Community Memory participants. That's important because it gives us a better picture of who uses Community Memory, which helps us reach out to potential new users more directly. In addition, we believe Community Memory's profile is enhanced simply by the presence of our trainers. People who may be shy or preoccupied at the time of a training are much more curious about "that wooden box with the computer in it" after they've seen others using it.

Needless to say, we're continuing our on-site trainings. With our new Outreach Assistant, Maria Delgado, we're better able to deliver and promote these trainings, as well as record the valuable feedback that new users give us. Enclosed you'll find the new training schedule and new user sign-up sheets that should be posted on or near the Community Memory kiosk. We feel the sign-up sheet is an important part of our training series because it lets passers-by know when a Community Memory representative will be at your site.

Your continued support is greatly appreciated. I look forward to seeing you again soon.

It's been one year since Community Memory expanded to our current network of ten public-access computer terminals. We're encouraged by the increase in usage in the past year: two thousand people use Community Memory each month and there are now eighty-seven different discussion forums. As you know, Community Memory participants are often people who would not ordinarily have access to computers. We're delighted to have a opportunity to introduce them to our computerized information exchange.

To that end, we are launching a new training series which we hope will encourage those who may have been shy before, to experiment with Community Memory and to discover new information and vital discussions. Additionally, our team of programmers have updated the Community Memory software to simplify a number of functions.

Based on the information you gave me, I've developed a schedule for on-site trainings. I've enclosed this schedule for your review as well as a sign-up sheet which can be posted near the Community Memory terminal at your site. The sign-up sheet lets passers-by know when 'a trainer will be at your site. I don't expect many people to sign up initially, but it will be helpful to let them know when trainings will be delivered.

This new training series is part of our first birthday celebration, as is the launch of the new, simplified Community Memory software. We will be installing new signs and a few other goodies at each terminal, to announce our birthday. Best of all, on Friday, March 29, Community Memory will accept all new messages for FREE. No quarter necessary. We're calling this promotion <u>Free Association</u>. We're encouraging people to freely associate with Community Memory - for FREE! And, we'll kick off the training series on that day, as well.

As I mentioned on the phone, Community Memory is a public access, two-way, participatory computer bulletin board which now has a terminal at the International House as well as six other sites around Berkeley.

The system is easy to use; over 150 people per day are using the system to read and write messages. We're started doing training for those who are computer shy, so people are welcome to contact us for more information.

Thank you for your longstanding interest in Community Memory (CM) and for making it possible for us to site a terminal at International House.

I would like to confirm that Community Memory Project (CMP) is making the Community Memory terminal available at no cost to International House. The costs associated with the installation, and monthly service fees for the dedicated telephone circuit which connects the terminal to the central machine will we borne by CMP. The terminal enclosure, all its contents, as well as any affixed materials are the sole property of CMP. Furthermore, as of 10/01/89, CMP is carrying liability insurance to protect International House from any claims that may result from accidents at or around the computer terminal.

We understand that International House will make available the current location for the terminal as well provide continuous electricity for the terminal's operation.

Should either International House or Community Memory elect to change any of the above arrangements, and both parties are not in concordance with the change, the party who elects to change the agreement must notify the other party in writing at least 6 months before the change is to go into effect. If, however, both parties agree to a change, the change may take place immediately or when mutually agreed upon by both parties.

I thought you might like to know, that since the day it was installed, the International House terminal has become the most used terminal on the network. I salute your insights into the creative potentials of this technology, and again thank you for your assistance in siting a terminal at International House.

The Community Memory Project brings together local individuals and groups to share information and resources, and to discuss critical issues affecting our community. Through the use of an electronic bulletin board with ten public access computer sites in Berkeley, the Community Memory Project both encourages and facilitates dialogue, information-sharing and constituency-building.

Community Memory's unique design demands that users behave, not simply as information consumers, but as active participants and builders of an information exchange. Anyone can read or write messages about any subject they choose. 2000 people each month use Community Memory to share information, opinions and resources. Central Library, South Library, West Library, and the Claremont Library are all Community Memory sites. (For a complete list of Community Memory sites, see attached brochure.) The support and assistance of the Berkeley Public Library in this project has been invaluable.

2. COMMUNITY MEMORY TRAINING

From January through July, we conducted 30 "Introduction to Community Memory" sessions at the South and West Libraries, as well as 18 sessions at the Senior Center. In seven months, we trained 190 people, including 87 first time computer users, to use Community Memory to read and write messages.

In August, we completed a system-wide evaluation in which representatives of the South and West Libraries participated. As a result we have developed an on-line tutorial using simple language and on-screen exercises to demonstrate basic keys and explain the system's structure. We're in the process of recruiting work study students to assist with on-site training.

3. WHAT'S ON-LINE?

Community Memory currently includes 61 on-line forums, ranging from job listings to discussions of local issues to jokes. Seventeen of these forums are hosted by community agencies, including the City of Berkeley, the Cable TV Task Force, Revitalization Exchange, Berkeley TRIP, and Vista Community College. Five forums are based on data from the Berkeley Information Network: Rental Space, Self-Help Law, Funlines, Infolines, and Emergency food. 4. HOW IS COMMUNITY MEMORY BEING USED?

I wanted to give you an update on Community Memory in the libraries.

We've trained 190 people, including 87 first time computer users, to use Community Nemory to read and write messages. Through the end of July, we did drop-in training at the West and South Branches, as well as the North Berkeley Senior Center, at least three times a month.

In August, we undertook a system-wide evaluation in which representatives of the South and West Libraries participated. As a result we have developed an on-line tutorial using simple language and on-screen exercises to demonstrate basic keys and explain the system's structure. We're in the process of recruiting work study students to assist with on-site training.

The following forums, with information from the Berkeley Information Network, are on the system: Rental Space, Self-Help Law, Funlines, Infolines, and Emergency food. We are in the process of developing an internship program to assist with getting more of the Berkeley Information Network on-line.

Since May, a number of new forums have been added to Community Memory, including Senior Resources (in partnership with the North Berkeley Senior Center), Job Training at Vista College, Women, Anarchy, and Military Facts. Ten community institutions are currently managing 18 forums.

In addition, 61 nonprofit groups and community agencies use Community Nemory to announce meetings, promote events, publicize services, recruit volunteers and new members, find new staff, and assist in community organizing. Seventy-nine small businesses tell users about their services through the system and use Community Nemory to recruit staff.

Community Memory is currently being used by about 2000 people each month, and we are developing an active core of on-going participants who use the system to discuss a range of issues.

I wanted to give you an update on Community Memory training at the libraries.

Through the end of March, Community Memory trained 135 people to use the system. As you know, we've been doing drop-in training at the West and South Branches at least three times a month. From mid-December 1989 to March 31, 1990, we've trained 72 people at these two branches:

45 men 27 women 11 youth 1 senior 29 whites, 31 blacks, 9 asians, 3 hispanics 25 people who had never used a computer before 18 people left messages during the training

I've also trained 3 librarians at the Central Branch, 4 at the South Branch and 1 at the West Branch. The South Branch has also been using the system to publicize their Community Forums this month. We have also been talking with Sandra about putting the ethnic calendar on Community Memory.

The following forums, with information from the Berkeley Information Network, are on the system: Rental Space, Self-Help Law, Funlines, Infolines, and Emergency food. Tom is talking to Sayre about including more information on the system.

Since January, we've gained a number of new forums including: Senior Cuisine, BioForum, Recipes & Cooking, MAGICK, Assistance Wanted, Poetry, Vietnam Day Committee Reunion, Cable TV, and Dreams. Seven community institutions are now managing 12 forums and a number of new forums are in development.

In addition, 44 nonprofit groups and community agencies use Community Memory to announce meetings, promote events, publicize services, recruit volunteers and new members, find new staff, and assist in community organizing. Fifty-eight small businesses tell users about their services through the system.

Community Memory is currently being used about eight hours a day, and is on the increase. The Berkeley Libraries have been gracious site hosts, for our system. We really appreciate your support, Regina, and the cooperation of your staff. Regina Minudra Neeting with Evelyn 5.10.90

Scrolling Through Libraries of the Future

Staff Reporter of THE WALL STREET JOURNAL WASHINGTON-Perched in front of a computer and a bank of electronic video equipment in the Library of Congress, Ricky Erway is exploring the library of the future.

Choosing from manuscripts, books, movies, pictures and recordings, the library planning assistant selects photographs and enters the word "Roosevelt." Soon she is viewing 25 pictures culled from a collection of 28,000 taken between 1898 and 1920. Some show Theodore Roosevelt, others Roosevelt campaign banners. One is a picture of a bison named Roosevelt, "the king of the herd."

This is the first phase of "The American Memory," an ambitious Library of ngress program to put some of its ique collections on optical and compact disks and then make them available to libraries around the country.

American Memory will make extensive collections accessible to the public, including the papers of government officials ranging from Henry Clay to Henry Kissinger, as well as archives on ethnic groups and many of the earliest movies and sound recordings.

The electronic library isn't likely to appeal to people who think of libraries as warm, friendly places with leather chairs and open stacks for browsing. But the library hopes that the multimedia ability to combine text, movies, still photos and sound will attract more children of a video age to libraries.

"This is a wonderful tool for school libraries, and it will lure people who don't normally use libraries by bringing in new technologies." Librarian of Congress James Billington said last year when he persuaded Congress to back the program. The library plans to spend \$6 million of government funds on the project over the next six years. It is also getting assistance from Apple Computer Inc., International Business Machines Corp., the U.S. unit of Pioneer Electronic Corp. of Japan, and two private foundations.

Equipment manufacturers consider the ation's 115,000 libraries, most of which are in schools, a large potential market. Apple has established what it calls the Li-



brary of Tomorrow program to make grants funding computer innovations in libraries.

The hardware package the Library of Congress uses for its demonstrations costs about \$10,000. Aside from a computer, TV monitor and videodisk player, it includes a CD-Rom disk drive, which is a form of compact disk player for computers; a laser printer for text, cartoons and other graphics; and a video printer for photographs. The library also has a large hard disk drive for data storage.

Other libraries will be able to purchase a less powerful hardware package for around \$5,000. Many schools already are buying some of the equipment to take advantage of a growing volume of interactive video material, which allows students using computers linked to videodisk Christopher Bing

players to select lessons, respond to questions, and rearrange materials for presentations.

The National Geographic Society, Lucasfilm Ltd. and Apple have formed a venture to produce interactive videos and are selling a teaching tool called "A Geographic Perspective on American History." ABC News, a unit of Capital Clties/ ABC Inc., and Optical Data Corp. have combined to issue interactive videos on the 1988 presidential campaign, the life of Martin Luther King Jr. and the Palestinian conflict in Israel. In addition, Optical Data has asked the state of Texas to make a science curriculum on videodisks part of its textbook program.

But nobody can offer the wealth of material the Library of Congress has. The li-Please Turn to Page B8, Column 6

brary is starting by focusing on three eras: the 19th century, the period from 1890-1920 when the U.S. became a world power, and the period between the world wars. It doesn't intend to provide a comprehensive, chronological view of each period, but rather special materials that aren't easily available elsewhere.

For instance, the American Memorywill make available some 14,000 personal letters written to and by Sen. Robert La-Follette Sr., the Wisconsin progressive who served in the Senate from 1906 to 1925. "I don't know if the world thinks it wants these letters, but when they're accessible, I think people will find them rewarding," says Carl Fleischhauer, coordinator of the American Memory project.

The library expects some offerings to be incorporated into courses and curricula around the country. For instance, it will issue on disk an extensive collection of pamphlets written by and about blacks in America. These were collected between 1871 and 1923 by a library employee who had been instructed to "secure a copy of every book and pamphlet in existence written by a Negro author:"

The American Memory also will include offerings of the earliest movies, including one of an actual battle in the Spanish-American War, and Thomas Edison's first sound recordings.

The first materials will be available in 1992. The library hasn't decided how to distribute them or how much they will cost, but officials assume they will use commercial vendors.

Eventually, the library hopes to store copies of certain archives on a large computer that could be tapped via telephone lines. Anyone with a personal computer and modem could search collections and receive copies of documents. "Libraries of the future will be a service, not a place," predicts Robert Zich, director of planning at the library. "What you once had to go to the Library of Congress to see can be viewed at home. That's the capability."

We are scheduling our first meeting for one of the following dates:




The Videos are coming!

Sometime in early June, the Central Library will begin loaning out video cassettes. As a result of a generous gift of the Friends of the Library, we were able to purchase a large collection of Public Broadcasting System's quality videos. \$60,000 worth of videos were made available to many public libraries for only \$6,000. The titles include, "I, Claudius," selected Shakespeare plays, "The Ascent of Man," and several from the American Playhouse series. In addition to these wonderful tapes, we are also purchasing selected classic films, quality children's videos, cultural recordings such as ballet and operatic performances, and some how-to-do-it video cassettes. We plan to have approximately 500 video cassettes available for loan when we begin the service.

We anticipate that this will be a popular service at the library, and consequently, we will not take reserves on videos.

Anyone having a valid Berkeley Public Library card which is free of fines or missing materials will be eligible to borrow the videos. A brief form needs to be completed for our records. All video cassettes will be loaned for two nights at no charge. The videos must be returned prior to 9 a.m. the following day. There will be an overdue fee of \$2.00 per fraction of a day overdue for each video borrowed should it become overdue.

The library's new video collection will be housed in the basement of the Central Library. The Newspaper Room is now being renovated so that there (continued on page 2)

An Outstanding Annual Meeting

The May 9, 1990 Annual Meeting of the Friends of the Berkeley Public Library was a memorable event. The beautiful buffet luncheon and meeting, which took place at St. John's Presbyterian Church, were exceptional. Katherine Bradley, who was in charge of the arrangements, and her committee, deserve hearty congratulations for the success of the affair.

There was a short business meeting. Lawrence Rarick presented and discussed significant aspects of the Treasurer's report, and announced some of the gifts which have been, or will be, given to the Library, including library school scholarships, video cassettes, and support for programs for children, youths and adults. Katherine Bradley, Nominating Committee Chairman, announced the following nominations: President, Martha Lawrence; 1st Vice-President, Anita Navon; 2nd Vice-President, Althea Doyle; Recording Secretary, June Tichinin; Corresponding Secretary, Lynne Crocker; Treasurer, Lawrence Rarick; and new Board Members, Virginia Pratt, Virginia Leimbach and James Burch. The slate was elected by unanimous vote. A progress report on preparations for the June Book Sale was given by the Co-Chairmen, Eve Lier and Heidi Gillies.

Library employees receiving awards from the Friends for long, dedicated service included Ted Follins, Amy Kuo and Connie Reyes, each for fifteen years of service, and Dolores Wright, Gwen Jones, Pete McElligott and Cheryl Palmer for 20 years service. Awards for 30 years of service went to Jim Jacobs and Lillian Lee. Loni Hancock, Mayor of Berkeley, and Fred Weekes, Berkeley City Council Member, were guests.

Highlight of the day was the most interesting talk given by Natalie Hahn. A librarian, as well as a former member of the Board of the Friends, she described her experiences and observations in Europe during the preceding year. While her husband was at Oxford as Eastman Professor, Natalie worked for the Bodleian Library as a volunteer with the ephemera collection. During the year, they had the opportunity to visit libraries in East Germany, Poland and the USSR. She offered a fascinating picture of how libraries operate and function in these various cultures, and stressed the importance of libraries everywhere, and for all peoples. Her presentation was a fitting climax to a most pleasant and fruitful meeting.

PROPOSAL SUMMARY

Public libraries, historically free, universally accessible and uncensored information resources serving all citizens are ideal setting for a technology designed to be be convivial, universally accessible, and serving the community at large. For this reason, the Community Memory Project, a Berkeley based nonprofit corporation proposes installing computer terminals connected to a community-wide network named Community Memory, in the South and West branches of the Berkeley Public Library.

This would be a joint exploratory step towards evaluating the feasibility of siting Community Memory terminals in all the Berkeley Public Libraries. The Community Memory Project will provide and pay for all the hardware, software, technical assistance and follow-up, phone lines and monthly phone charges, as well as insurance on the terminals themselves. The Community Memory Project has no intentions of charging the libraries for this service during the six month trial period or at any time thereafter.

Tentative siting of the terminals in the respective branches has already been jointly identified by Branch Directors and Community Memory personnel. The libraries will need to furnish electrical outlets for the terminals and pay for electricity (less than 100 watts) consumed.

WHAT IS CM?

Community Memory is a system for the public management of public information. An apt metaphor for the Community Memory network is "A Village in a City." Like a giant interactive bulletin board simultaneously operating in several locations throughout Berkeley, CM is an open channel for community communication and a way for people with common interests to find

The CM network stores information in the form of messages. The messages reside within topical "forums" and use a sophisticated indexing and stringing together feature which allows the user to easily locate information on any topic. Each forum serves as a listing and a podium for debate on a particular subject or issue. "Available Housing." "Science Fiction," "Adult Education," "Cars for Sale," "Trivia Enthusiasts," are some examples of past forums on CM. Browsing and reading information from any one of the publicly located terminals is free. Adding a message to the database requires the user to deposit a quarter. Users may respond to any message already in the database, add messages to any forum, even set up their own forums. All responses to an existing message are automatically "tagged" as responses and can be called up when browsing the root message.

GROUP HISTORY

The Community Memory Project, a 501(c)4 non-profit corporation in Berkeley was established in 1977, and has become nationally recognized for its efforts in creating publicly accessible, easy-to-use, two-way communication tools for the sharing of community information and resources. We operate out of a small store front in Berkeley, which houses our office space and computer equipment. The organization is run by a five-member board of directors, elected annually by a membership made up of 15 people working in support of the project. Coming from a variety of backgrounds, the project members share an interest in deriving the greatest social benefit from new technology. Lee Felsenstein, inventor of the Osborne computer, is one of our founders and presently a member. Steve Wozniak, inventor of the Apple computer, is a past contributor. The CMP's grassroots approach to cutting edge technology has received considerable print and broadcast media attention.

We installed a four terminal pilot system in Berkeley in mid-1984, and it was in continuous operation for more than four years. Terminals were located at the Shattuck and Telegraph Coops, La Pena Cultural center and the Whole Earth Access store on 7th and Ashby. In over four years of operation, the system received considerable use, clearly demonstrating that the general public can and will use such tools when given the opportunity. In a typical month at its peak usage, the terminals were in use over 25% of the time, with the system being used about 2000 times, collecting over 1000 new messages, with 15,000 items being read by users. The system was a diverse and vital exchange, with uses ranging from listing used cars and apartments for rent, sharing poetry and jokes, to social services information and facts about recycling, all entered at the public terminals.

Besides the operation of our pilot system, we have participated in a number of smaller demonstrations of public-access technology. During the 1984 Summer Olympics in L.A., a CM system augmented with videodisc linked several cafes and restaurants in the Electronic Cafe project.

PLANSFOR A BERKELEY CM

The software for the new evolution of CM is running in our offices, the equipment for ten public terminals has been purchased, even the tamper-proof enclosures, built by a local cabinet maker are complete. We will begin installing the first of ten public Berkeley Community Memory terminals in May. Currently we are finalizing site selections and beginning to "seed" the data base with community resources information. Sites include: the International House on the U.C.B. campus, Cody's Books, La Pena Cultural Center, and Milt's Laundromat.

We are also actively pursuing grant money which will allow us to develop educational and outreach programs designed to reach citizens without access to other advanced telecommunications services. Through these outreach efforts, we expect to contact hundreds of persons in our community who might otherwise remain unfamiliar with advancing telecommunications services, and to give them a favorable, skill-building exposure to Community Memory tools, thus enhancing their capacity to be intelligent, informed consumers who can meet modern technology on favorable ground. An integral evaluation program will monitor the effectiveness of the various components of this proposal and allow comparison of alternative approaches. We are including a copy of the grant narrative Community Memory Project submitted recently to the Telecommunications Education Trust. This trust was established by the Public Utilities Commission specifically to educate California citizens about emerging telecommunications technologies. It outlines in detail specific issues we wish to address in Berkeley via a Community Memory system and accompanying outreach programs.

IN AN EFFORT TO KEEP THINGS CLEAN ...

Operating the pilot network for four years gave us the opportunity to thoroughly evaluate features, uses, as well as abuses of the system. The occurrence of obscenity on that network met with occasional criticism. In order to address and resolve the problem of obscenity on CM, we devoted considerable thought, time and creativity when designing the next evolution of Community Memory. Hardware and software changes were made in order to create a tool that serves everyone in a responsible and non-offending manner while continuing our commitment to open, unmediated information exchange.


Following are practical changes incorporated into the new system which serve as barriers and filters to significantly reduce the likelihood of offending users:

COIN BOXES: The writing of messages on the pilot network was a free feature. This free access and convenience gave rise to prank messages which took the form of curses, slurs, and gratuitous profanity without context. To curtail this most basic and gratuitous obscenity, we equipped the new terminals with a coin box mechanisms which charges the user 25¢ when adding a message. The system informs the user at the start of adding a message that a quarter will be be required for the message to be stored in the database. Once the user indicates that he/she is finished writing the message, the machine requests the money. Without the quarter the message is discarded rather than stored in the data base. Reading messages for any length of time will remain a free feature.

INFORMATION TOPICAL FORUMS: The pilot network could be easily browsed message-by-message in reverse chronological order. One viewed the message roster by message number and a leading sentence. Every message on the system could be read in this fashion, simply by working ones way through the list. The new system abandons this shopping list approach, and organizes information into topical forums. Each forum is a unique depository of information in the form of messages. The user browses messages on the system by first choosing a topic of interest, and then choosing among the forums related to that topic. This approach at once facilitates the quick retrieval of specific information, and eliminates chance encounters with offensive material. As in a library or book store, potentially offensive information is appropriately "shelved." It is up to the reader to have an interest in a specific subject and then to be able to find it.

FORUM HOSTS: Every forum has a host or moderator. It is the forum host's responsibility to define the forum and then to maintain the information in it. Forum hosts have final authority over the content of their particular forums. They have the power to "purge" undesirable messages from their forums, thus keeping the forum focused and topical. In order to assist potential forum hosts we will conduct free workshops on how to set up and maintain effective forums on CM once the terminals are placed in the community for public use.

INFORMATION PROVIDERS: There will exist a special class of forum hosts, comprised of social services groups, community, cultural, and civic organizations. Working with CM staff, these groups will "seed" the database with information beneficial to the greater Berkeley community. This foundation of information will demonstrate the utility of CM to the public. The seeded information will range from calendars of events, to listings of local social services agencies in the community and the services they provide. Eden I&R and the Berkeley Free Clinic have expressed interest in utilizing CM as a public interface for their listings. Berkeley TRIP will furnish commuter and mass transit information. The Berkeley Information Network is experimenting with placing information into well indexed categories, thus making it accessible on any CM terminal. Before terminals are placed in public, a wealth of community resources will already be a part of the CM database.

Self-Help for the Elderly

Self-Help for the Elderly serves the seniors of Chinatown. They have five meal sites which serve at least 100 meals per site. They also provide a range of social services, home care, counseling, etc.

SeniorNet

Self-Help for the Elderly has been a Senior Net Site since February 1989. There is also a site in Menlo Park, at the University of San Francisco, and a new site opening at Aquatic Park. The SHFE site has five Mackintosh's in a room in their administrative offices as well as a laser printer. The computers are also occasionally used by SHFE staff.

SeniorNet trains only those fifty-five plus. No experience in using computers is necessary. Most of the people trained have no experience. They train in simple computer activities trying to encourage on-going use.

Class Structure & Promotion

Classes last for a six week period. They teach: word processing, advanced word processing, database, spread sheet and telecommunications. They have taught word processing twice and advanced word processing, spread sheet, and telecommunications once. Senior Net provides training materials. They also have on-going lab time, whether classes are in session or not. Fridays from 9 to 5. A monitor is available to answer questions. Senior Net itself is most interested in having the site and those trained going on-line

They have promoted their classes through the Chinese newspapers and word of mouth. For the first round almost 100 people expressed interest and 75 participated.

Costs

Pacific Bell sponsored the start-up, donating \$10,000. SHFE is negoatiating for on-going support from PacBel but it is not secure. SHFE also pays a \$3000 fee to hook-up to TYMENET. Individual membership in Seniornet used to cost \$10, but is being increased to \$25, which, Woodie notes, is a significant increase for those on fixed incomes. SHFE charges an additional \$2.00 fee for each class to pay for discs, etc. SeniorNet/Self-Help for the Elderly Page 2

Issues

Major difficulty is coming up with instructors for training. Currently training is primarily done by volunteers from the SHFE staff, but Woody wants to recruit seniors who have been trained. So far he has not had much luck, but he hopes next year to put together a schedule of volunteers. SeniorNet at USF might also provide some graduate students to serve as trainers.

Self-Help for the Elderly has had some difficulty getting their own constituency (Seniors in Chinatown) to use the training, because the people they serve are predominantly mono-lingual. Someone who is developing software for Chinese speakers but the cost for the program was prohibitive. They have taught some of these seniors to use the MacPaint program.



What is the SBNDC?

The SBNDC was formed in 1987 by community residents interested in working together for change. We have almost 200 members. Any resident of South Berkeley, or anyone whose principal business is in South Berkeley may join. Our monthly Board meetings, held on the second Saturday of each month from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., are open to the community. We also have several committees that work on issues that are important to our community. These are open to the membership; our active committees include:

Arts & Culture Committee - we brought you the banners that fly above Adeline Street and are working to preserve our rich cultural heritage.

Public Safety - our group works on ongoing health and safety issues including improvement of the delivery of city services to the community.

Our training series included 16 sessions, at least one at each site. With 16 training sessions and 15 new users, that's nearly one new user per training, and that's a ratio that equals success in our book.


It has been equally pleasing just to be out at the sites on a more regular basis. Not only do we get to see you more often, but it's enabled us to connect with more Community Memory participants. RAP has had a number of problems in its first year of implementation

o maintaining records of where kids are and changes in their program.

o administration -- the Executive Committee (of David Kakeshiba, Phil Cotton, and Larry) was too small. Other groups didn't have enough input. Now putting together an executive where there is one representative from each agency

o staffing -- of the initial four case counselors, 1 went back to original job, 1 quit because it was too much work for too little pay, 1 (Regina Phelps) was fired for not reporting enough to the agencies although the kids loved her. The caseload is supposed to be 1 counselor for 36 kids, but there are currently only three case counselors.

o stipends -- there is disagreement as to whether kids should be docked their stipends if they don't participate fully.

Nonetheless, intake continues, and there are currently 120 kids participating.

Taleb would like Community Memory to participate in the final RAP picnic, to make a sales pitch about the service and to train kids at the library on the spot. Evelyn said fine, but Taleb has to clear this with David and Larry.

Evelyn said CM had trained 13 kids at drop-in trainings at the West and South Branches of the Berkeley Public Library. She said she would like to train any of the kids in the mentorship program or their mentors. She also said she would like to convene a small group of kids to talk about what ought to be on the database.

Taleb said he would make the education advisory group meeting on the 31 from 3-5.

Evelyn made an appointment to train Marisha Anderson who works part time for SBNDC. Evelyn will call Doris Lenoir to schedule a time to train her.

SBNDC Staff Report Covering Agency Activities of September & October, 1989

Community Activities and Agency Business

In September, the SBNDC co-sponsored a Crack Cocaine conference with the Berkeley Crack Cocaine Task Force. On September 23, a meeting of the general membership of the SBNDC was held at the South Berkeley Senior Center. Thirty five members attended - all committees made presentations, followed by voting on the new Bylaws, and a hot potluck dinner. Several new members joined the SBNDC. Since we did not have enough votes to reach a decision on the Bylaws, a second ballot was mailed with stamped self addressed envelopes. The Bylaws have been approved by the general membership with 49 "ayes" and 9 "nays". Staff will file the appropriate documents to implement the change in our fiscal year. The Board of Directors had worked on the revisions since May. The Director and Tom Nemcik of Community Memory attended a September meeting of the Commission on Aging to propose a jointly sponsored Chores for Seniors Service. We are refining the program and remain in contact with the Commission regarding the possibility of implementing it.

Tree Planting

With the help of Jonathon Spikes and Jerquin Coleman, the two SBNDC Youth Interns, we have continued to plant trees on Saturdays. Over fifty trees were planted in September and October on Oregon St., scattered sites, and at Harmon and King on November 4. We got behind schedule due to rain and will be planting trees on Emerson and Carleton Sts. November 18.

South Berkeley Area Plan

Staff and membership of the SBNDC participated in hearings and meetings of the Planning Commission and the City Council regarding the South Berkeley Area Plan and the decision to apply for status as a redevelopment district. Board and General Members spoke at the hearings and the decision was made to pursue status for South Berkeley as a Redevelopment District. For further information regarding the significance of this or about the South Berkeley Area Plan, please call the SBNDC office. We still have copies of the Area Plan and the Environmental Impact Report will be ready for distribution in the near future. A great deal of work has gone into all aspects of the process, including the informational meetings which the committee staffed for Neighborhood Associations.

Youth Mentorship

In October, following hearings attended by the Director and Youth Mentorship Coordinator, the Real Alternatives Program was selected for funding and implementation of the At-Risk Youth Demonstration Program. The consortium of agencies includes BAYC (lead agency), YES, YAP, Adelante, Project Excellence, Break the Cycle, and SBNDC. Berkeley Boosters and New Perspectives have now been included. The SBNDC will receive \$5,500 over an eight month period for fingerprinting of the prospective Mentors and other costs of the Mentorship Program. The Coordinator has continued to meet with other programs and individuals for input into our program. The RAP Program will involve a goal of 30 mentorship relationships. Please call the office for more information on joining the committee, becoming a mentor, or referring at-risk youth to the RAP program.

Lorin Station Project

The committee has been meeting to make decisions regarding the composition of the building. At this point, it appears that the office component may not be financially feasible for the SBNDC. In that case, we will proceed with a commercial space on the ground floor and housing above. The Director completed a successful application for the SBNDC to participate in the Bay Area Housing Support Collaborative. This program consists of four sessions of housing finance and development workshops with a \$15,000 assistance grant to our project. The topographic survey of our lot has been completed. As of November 9, the loan documents for the Redevelopment Agency forgiveable loan have been recorded. Staff has an invoice procedure with Planning & Community Development for the funds. The Guitar Center will have its Grand Opening on Nov. 10 and their store and the completion of rehabilitation of the building will add to the efforts to revitalize the Adeline Alcatraz corridor.

New Office

There was some damage from the earthquake to our present office at 1771 Alcatraz, but not sufficient to make it dangerous. We are still expecting to move into 1767 in December, but it is not clear exactly when. We had hoped to have a joint Open House with BDRS and BRSB in our new office in December and may still be able to do so. The new office space will have an open area in the front for meetings and use of a Community Memory system. We will have hot water (which we don't have in 1771), a small kitchen area, fans, operable windows, carpeting, and wheelchair accessible bathroom. When we are clear on the move-in date, we will notify the entire membership of an Open House.
